

Red (Easy):

- Check all your own capital letters and full stops.
- Use exclamation marks for power!
- Use 'because' to give your reasons (e.g. "You should keep going because your wife is so hungry!")
- Use 'but' to argue back (e.g. "I know you're scared to get caught but your family might starve if you don't.")

Amber (Middle):

- Ask questions to back up your argument (e.g. "Do you want to get caught by the farmers?")
- Use 'even though' as a sentence starter to argue back (e.g. "Even though it's scary, you need to do it for your family.")
- Use 'however' instead of 'but'.
- Make sure all your sentences follow the same argument (last time did this, we sometimes ended up with a mix of for and against sentences)

Green (Hard):

- Use 'because' as a sentence starter (e.g. "Because your family needs you, you definitely need to keep going.")
- Add lots of further detail to each reason you give.
- Structure your work in paragraphs, maybe a different paragraph for each different reason.

Badger, you should keep on taking the food because you need to look after your family. They are getting hungrier and hungrier so they might starve if you don't bring them more food! It's your job to look after them now. I know you are afraid of the farmers, but your family are depending on you. Do you want them to go hungry?

Even though you feel bad for stealing, you are only stealing because you are desperate for food. I know you don't want to upset the farmers, however the farmers don't care about you at all! All they ever do is hunt animals like you so you shouldn't worry about them. Because they are so nasty, you shouldn't feel guilty about stealing from them.
